'No dyslexics' sperm bank policy

'The Guardian' on 30.12.2015 featured an article debating the decision made by the largest UK sperm bank—The London Sperm Bank to ban donors who have dyslexia.

Anne Perkins discussed the issue of how exactly do we decide where the line should be drawn between the extremes of lifeshortening disease and having perceived genetic perfection.

In response to this article, **Margaret Malpas** British Dyslexia Association (BDA)
Joint Chair and **Dominic Addington** Lib.
Dem., House of Lords and BDA President wrote the following:

'Why would you want to screen out potential entrepreneurs, engineers and artists? Dyslexia confers strengths and the difficulties with acquiring literacy can be mitigated by the right teaching.

Anyway, their aims are impossible:10% of the population are dyslexic—turning away the very small number who've had it confirmed would still leave a large number in the available gene pool.'
