Cook in the books! At 16 Marco Pierre White became an apprentice pastry chef. He opened his own restaurant in 1987 and received his 1st Michelin star the same year. Two more stars quickly followed, making him at 33 the youngest chef to have earned three Michelin stars.

"I was very fortunate that I entered a world where I didn't have to read or write. I entered a world of cooking where I expressed with my fingers and so that built my confidence. Over the years I've taught myself how to read. I've taught myself how to spell. I still struggle but I have to read very slowly and because I read slowly and because I struggle to absorb, I tend not to read, even though I have 1000's of books at home, they're all giant picture books."

Pierre White said he realised he was dyslexic when his son was diagnosed after his school alerted the family. "They went into great detail about dyslexia and that's when I was able to label myself as being dyslexic. They could have been talking about the same boy, but many years previous when I was a boy they never spoke of dyslexia. It's not a stigma to be labelled with dyslexia. Individuals with dyslexia have great talents and great qualities." Catch-up Tuition help

Did you know that Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg announced in September 2012 that intensive catch-up tuition is to be given for all pupils who start secondary school without having achieved the required levels in English and maths?

The new catch-up premium will help almost 110,000 pupils this year to receive extra help in literacy and numeracy and stop them falling further behind at a critical stage in their education.

This support is needed as evidence shows that pupils who are behind in English and maths when they start secondary school will struggle to achieve GCSEs.

Secondary schools will receive an added £500 for every Year Seven pupil who has not achieved at least Level 4 at Key Stage 2 in reading and maths. The money will be used by school to provide additional tuition or intensive support in small groups, giving pupils valuable help to bring them up to speed so that they are more likely to succeed at secondary school.

Find out what your local school is doing.

What are the benefits of joining our touch typing class?

- Your writing is easier to read.
- Properly learnt typing can be faster than handwriting.
- Your hand/arm won't get so tired. Typing is usually much less stressful.
- Spelling patterns can be easier to learn. Confusions such as b/d and u/n are removed since it's the learnt position of the letters that is used, not their orientation.
- It's easier to construct sentences correctly when the speed of writing is closer to the speed of thinking.
